Field Day is an annual American Radio Relay League (ARRL) event that allows HAM radio operators to "fine-tune" their emergency communication skills. Generators are used to power the radios and antennas are set up in the field to put together self-sufficient, working stations. HAMs and non-HAMs alike will be allowed to get on the air and contact thousands of other operators throughout the US and the world making this the nation's largest HAM radio "on-air" event. Make plans now to join us for a fun-filled weekend with family and friends. They don't have to be a HAM operator to have a great time! Come out to Thacher Park on Saturday, June 25th or Sunday June 26th and get on the air, eat some great food, or just sit and chat....you don't want to miss this!

More than 2,200 ham radio clubs and 35,000 hams will participate in this one weekend of activities. One other important aspect of Field Day is that hams can operate on modes and bands that they can't normally use. Hams that have HF privileges act as control operators at their stations allowing those without HF privileges to operate on the HF bands. HAMSAT IS NOW VO-52

The ARRL Letter Vol. 24, No. 19 May 13, 2005 The latest Amateur Radio satellite now has an OSCAR designation. Acting at the request of AMSAT-India's Nagesh Upadhayaya, VU2NUD, AMSAT-NA's Bill Tynan, W3XO, has announced that HAMSAT (or VUsat) is VUsat-52 or VO-52 for short.

VO-52 is India's first Amateur Radio satellite. Its transponders were turned on shortly after its May 5 launch, and AMSAT-India Secretary "Pop" Kumar, VU2POP, has invited the global amateur community to use the satellite and e-mail any comments <reports@amsat.in>. Ground controllers have activated one of the two linear transponders aboard VO-52, which operates in Mode U/V, with passband center frequencies of 435.25 MHz for the uplink and 145.90 MHz for the downlink. Passbands are 50 kHz wide. For SSB, uplink in LSB and downlink in USB.

AMSAT-India says VO-52 has been monitored by radio amateurs around the world, and it has already received a few reports from users and listeners

ARRL TO SPONSOR AFFINITY CREDIT CARD The ARRL Letter Vol. 24, No. 20 May 20, 2005

The League will unveil its new ARRL VisaR Card--an affinity credit card with U.S. Bank-this week at Dayton Hamvention, which is playing host to the ARRL 2005 National Convention. U.S. Bank personnel will be on hand for the launch, Friday, May 20, at the ARRL EXPO 2005 exhibit area with applications for radio amateurs attending the convention who want to be among the first to apply. The no-annual-fee card is available to ARRL members and nonmembers.

"With every card issued and every purchase made, ARRL Visa card holders support ARRL programs and services at no additional cost to them," says ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R. "This is a great way for members to show off their support for ARRL and for Amateur Radio."

The card carries an attractive design with the ARRL logo. The words "Amateur Radio

Operator" appear prominently on the face of the card.

ARRL membership does not confer automatic eligibility to obtain a card. While there's no annual fee, the ARRL Visa card carries a credit limit of up to \$15,000 and 0 percent APR interest for the first six months. Certain terms and conditions do apply. U.S. Bank is the creditor, issuer and service provider.

At least initially, call signs cannot be embossed onto the card, Inderbitzen says. "We're working with U.S. Bank to find a suitable solution, but that will most likely be further down the line," he explained. B-PLUS Sept 05 deadline is Aug 27th.
